INTRODUCTION

Over the next several weeks we will begin to discover some principles that help grow our relationship with Jesus Christ. WHO IS GOD?

As you read the Bible you discover there are many ways God identifies Himself: Creator, Provider, Helper, and Deliverer. However, there is one way God identifies Himself more often than any other. Read the following verses and identify the most frequent way God is referred to in Scriptures.
